## Productivity Commission officially launched

We were delighted to formally launch the Productivity Commission at a roundtable event on 16 September. Our 18 Commissioners will hold quarterly evidence sessions with experts in the field of productivity to understand the problem and propose solutions, followed by a report highlighting the key issues to policymakers with suggestions to help improve the UK's productivity. The first session is on 23 November on with a focus on sizing the productivity problem nationally, regionally and sectorally. The Commission is led by our partner [NIESR](#).


## Green recovery research shared with politicians


## Levelling up: rebuilding innovation capacity


