Trends in firm-level total factor productivity

Understanding the UK's productivity performance since the financial crisis is complicated by the well-known challenges of estimating total factor productivity (TFP) using revenue data. A <u>new working paper</u> from The Productivity Institute uses a novel framework to estimate quality-adjusted TFP based on a firm-level revenue function. Minimum wage and skills

What effect did the increase in the UK national minimum wage (NMW) have in April 2016? Elodie Andrieu and Malgorzata Kuczera's <u>TPI working paper</u> uses detailed online job postings data in England to find that the higher NMW resulted in in an up-skilling effect – an estimated 11-percentage point decrease in the proportion of non-graduate vacancies and a 21-percentage point decline in the share of low-tech job adverts.


